This month's migratory bird is the black-capped chickadee. As the name suggests, this small songbird has a black cap and bib, along with puffy white cheeks and a gray back and tail. Its curiosity about people and everything else in its territory plus its quickness to discover bird feeders make it one of the first birds most people learn. If you fill a feeder with suet or sunflower seeds, they will come. And chickadees are not deterred by a feeder that swings in the breeze or one that is attached to a window with curious observers peering out. Chickadee calls are complex. The high-pitched chirping communicates general information and sounds predator alarms to warn of danger. The more *dee* notes in its call of *chickadee-dee-dee*, the higher the threat level.
